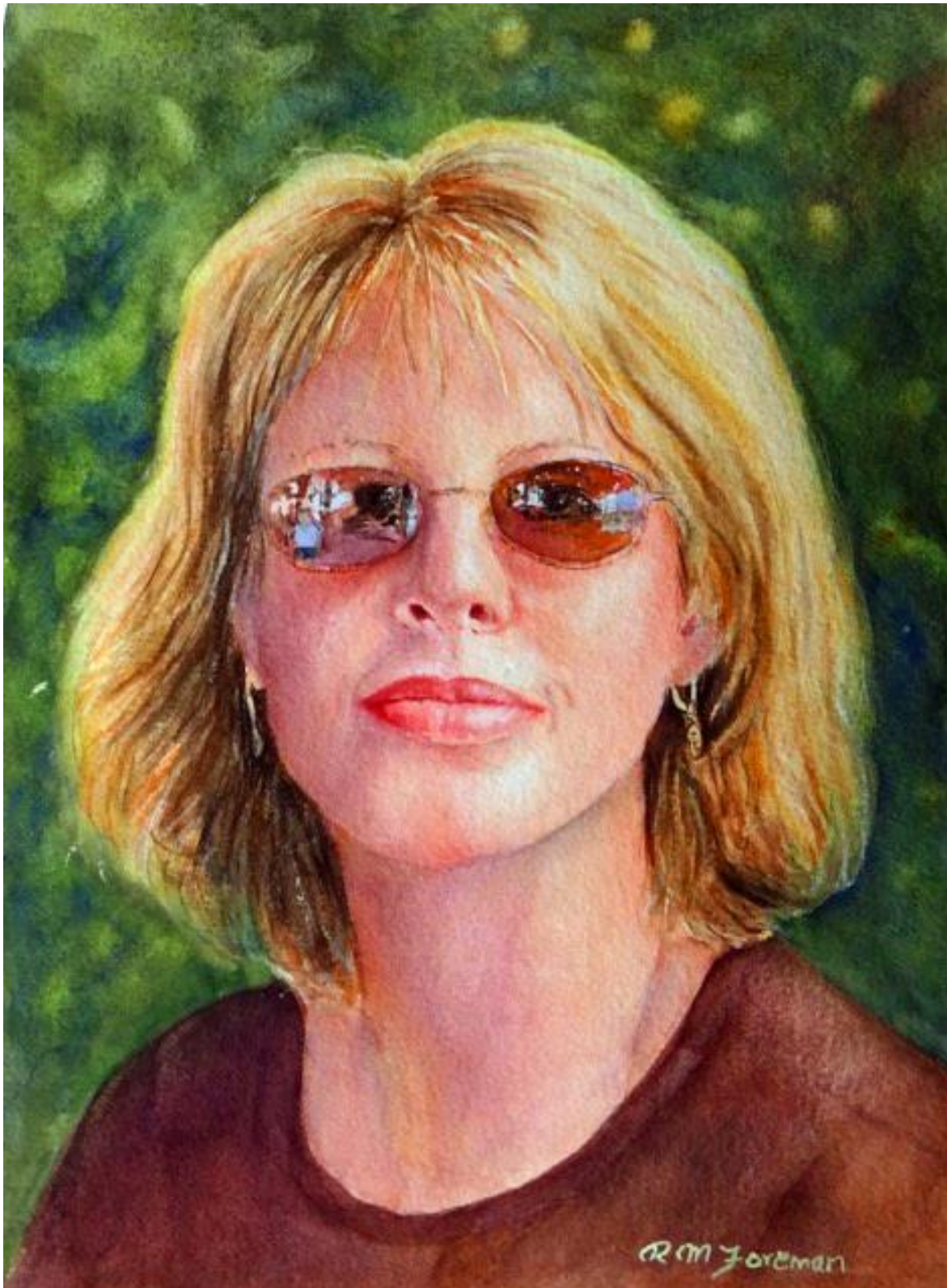

Spotlight Artist - RUTH FOREMAN

The extent of Ruth's exposure to art growing up was sketching in high school and painting a retail window for Halloween. When she was nineteen, she lived in New York's Rehearsal Club for women. While babysitting for the famous Mark Rothko, Ruth was exposed to abstract expressionist art: Harry Jackson's exquisite bronze cowboy sculptures and, through mutual friends, to Jackson Pollock's amazing creations. Not understanding most of what she saw, she took an art appreciation course at the New York's Metropolitan Museum. Little did she know she would be involved in her own artistic endeavors someday.

Ruth and her husband Hal relocated in 2000 from the seacoast of New Hampshire to Melbourne Beach after raising two daughters and taking early retirement.

In 2003 Ruth wrote and published "One Woman's Journey", her first creative endeavor. The loss of her mother in 1998 and recovering from grief inspired Ruth to share her journey through the grieving process in hopes that it would help others.

When she arrived in Florida, she carried a cellophane-wrapped, child's watercolor pallet and booklet she had picked up on a whim. Her first breakthrough came when she sought out artists Therese Ferguson, JeaJea Tremble and Linda Neal. All helped ignite Ruth's passion for watercolor and got her creative juices flowing.

After convalescing for three months following open heart surgery in 2013, she published her second book, "Girl On A Roll", a memoir of a NYC actress and model in the 1950's. It was based on personalities she had met in NY.

Ruth joined BWS after viewing her first SPLASH show in Cocoa Village. She was encouraged by her art teacher to enter this juried show each year regardless of one's experience level. That encouragement, along with attending the many mini-workshops taught by fellow BWS members, helped Ruth stimulate the need to learn more and more. She has evolved from painting flowers to painting portraits of animals and people, inspired by the various colors that can be painted into faces. Photos of neighborhood dogs seen on her walks, has led to doing at least 7 furry portraits. Her small Canon Powershot goes everywhere with her so she is ready for that perfect photo to paint.

Her awards include Second Place and MI Refuge Awards at the BWS MIWA 2011 Show for "Wading Ibis" below; BWS Splash 2012 Merit Award; FWS On-line Shows 2014, 2015, and 2017; Light Space & Time Animals Art Exhibition Special Merit Award 2016 and 2017, and Special Recognition; Art Gallery of Viera's Second Prize Silver Award in their Brush with Success juried art show for "Two to Tango" below; and the BWS Splash 2017 Bonnie Carter Memorial Award for "Reading Robin" (Ruth's daughter) on the cover.

Ruth is past secretary of BWS and currently edits the BWS Facebook page. She currently has several works in private collections in Brevard County, as well as throughout the country.

On May 13, 2017 the Brevard Watercolor society awarded George Gregory, Olivia Pickering, Maddie Roth and Kira Chinapen with a gift package and a \$500 scholarship check to be spent on art supplies, art classes or general needs of the students to help them grow as local watercolor artists. Each scholarship candidate is sponsored by their art teacher. Following the satisfaction of qualifications, the Brevard Watercolor Society's Board of Directors determines via an essay whether a student may be accepted as a recipient for the scholarship program.

The funding for the scholarship comes from the Brevard Watercolor Society and works as a partnership with Eastern Florida State College. Scholarships are also offered at the high school level.

UPCOMING ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS AND OTHER OPPORTUNITIES TO VOLUNTEER

In the past, Board Member elections were in November with transition in January. Between the holidays and working on Splash, our annual show in February, the current Board decided to move up the **elections** to the **September General Meeting**, after summer break.

The critical position of **Treasurer** remains unfilled. Working knowledge of bookkeeping is necessary, however, the Quicken program greatly simplifies the task. Newsletter Editor - Knowledge of a Word program is needed. A template is just updated with information provided by members for the quarterly newsletter. The position starts with the November issue with the help of Barbara Rios, current Editor.

Scholarship Chairperson - The EFSC scholarship program is minimal. The new, non-college program, initiated by Karen Krosnick, is very rewarding.

Painting Light and Color in Watercolor

In this Plein Air workshop I will give students the tools to create painterly and believable watercolors; but more importantly, I seek to take them beyond merely "copying" their subject. An artist needs to also paint from his heart and seek to communicate the emotional and spiritual beauty of God's creation. I paint and teach in a very straightforward traditional manner because I believe I can most honestly say what I want to with my brush and juicy watercolor paint. Workshop participants will learn about light and color and the way watercolor behaves, dealing with dark values in watercolor, painting reflections and much, much more. The goal of my workshop is to encourage each artist to advance his or her own



vision and to improve the skills necessary to communicate that in watercolor. I have enjoyed teaching watercolor for over 35 years and both my students and I have a lot of fun during the workshop. I paint mini-demos and full paintings but there is plenty of student painting time and personal help available every day. The subjects right around the workshop site are great for this type of workshop and the studio space is an excellent place to finish paintings started in the field or have a lesson or critique!
